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CIE Exam Results

Our end of year CIE exam results for 2016 delivered some superb results, and I would like to recap how the students did.

As this email drops into your inbox, Isabella Sharipova-Williams would have attended the Outstanding Cambridge Learner Awards in Auckland on Wednesday 15 February with her family, Mr Webb and myself.

Isabella Sharipova-Williams gained a prestigious Top in New Zealand award for her IGCSE French result of 98%. Isabella who was Year 10 last year, through mostly independent study, gained exceptional results not only for her French result but also got 97% in IGCSE Spanish. As part of gaining a Top in New Zealand award, Isabella has also earned herself a \$5,500 scholarship from Springbank School!

Our Year 9 students performed exceptionally well in their Cambridge Secondary1 Checkpoint exams. Our pass rates are: Maths 100%, Science 100%, and English 94%. Our students' average grade was in the "Very Good" to "Excellent" bands, and our students performed well above the international average in all three subjects. Mrs Jill Hatherly's English was the stand-out, scoring an entire grade above the international average – well up on last year's results. Well done to all of our hard-working Year 9 students. We look forward to sharing your individual results with you next week.

Our IGCSE (Year 11) students stood up to the plate and exceeded many of our expectations. 35% of all papers sat gained A Grades or above, with 8 A* (over 90%) grades gained. Another 25% of papers were awarded B Grades (above 70%), 23% C Grades (above 60%), and a further 9% D Pass Grades (over 50%). The overall amount of papers passed by our IGCSE students was 91%. Well done, team! Brilliant effort!

We were also very happy with our A Level (Year 12 & 13) students' results. 15% of all papers sat scored A Grade or above, and the percentage of all papers passed was 84%, which is the highest pass rate we have had in three years.

Congratulations to all of our hard-working, dedicated students and teachers. I am extremely proud of your achievements.

Gardens upgrade

A big thank you needs to go to Steve Walsh, Springbank School's Grounds Caretaker and Mike Warren for putting their green fingers to work during the summer holidays.

Steve has transformed the garden space beside the gym, under Room 6 and pathway up to Headstart, as well as cleaning out the garden behind Rooms 3 and 4, giving all the garden areas an overhaul with fresh new plants and life.

Mike continued to clean out and revamp the roadside boundary by preschool, putting in a smart hedge of Griselinia trees and punga logs.

The Year 12 and 13s stayed at camp to organise the three days' leadership activities, and the Year 10 and 11s headed to the Maunganui Bluff track, which climbs 450m above sea level. It was during this experience that I came to realise exactly how incredibly amazing this group of students are. I took off with the front pack, getting a good pace going. After 10 minutes, quite chuffed with my efforts, I paused for a breather and a drink, giving those poor students an opportunity to catch up with me. As I turned, 15 faces stared back at me, their facial expressions communicating, "hurry up old man"... so I went for it.



At the top, Dean was the first student... in gumboots! Most of the other students filed in in groups within the next 1/2 hour. What I was most impressed with, even more than Gumboot Man, was the fact that EVERY Year 10 and 11 student made it to the top of the bluff that day. An inspirational feat.

We just need one or two more adults to join our teams, and the great thing is, is that you don't even need to have played hockey before.

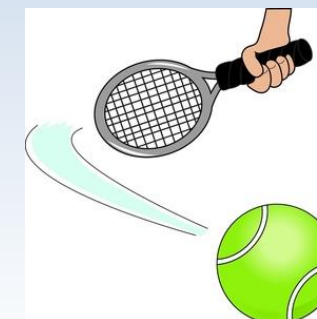
The women's competition will be played on Wednesday evenings and the men's on Thursday evenings.
